FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday is Father's Day. Fathers and mothers are seeing a great deal more of their children and each other during the Covid restrictions and this is no doubt changing some of the dynamics of family life. A great deal of good can out of this – a new awareness of family life as a team effort and the level of interdependence between the generations. On Friday afternoon, FJT School had a virtual assembly when we celebrated Father's Day with some edifying and amusing videos and some lovely tributes to their fathers from many children. The session, organised by a Family Education Coordinator, Angela Mills, included a Prayer for Fathers, the *Our Father*, and a blessing. May we all give thanks and pray for our fathers, both alive and departed, united in the communion of saints.

The weeks under the Covid restrictions seem to pass quickly. I have spent a solid week catching up on **canon law work** where I had fallen behind. I have been writing 'Observations' for nullity proceedings where, as a Defender of the Bond (*Defensor vinculi*), I must direct the Tribunal's attention to deficiencies in the evidence in the case for nullity. It is not my job to argue for the validity of marriage – every marriage is presumed to be valid – but to make sure that evidence and arguments against the validity of the marriage are sufficiently strong to result in a decree of nullity. In other words, to make sure it is done properly. This is, in a way, in order to protect the dignity of marriage.

Frankly, most applications for nullity succeed because it is the practice of the Tribunal to only commence cases with reasonable prospects of success. There is quite a complex jurisprudence supporting this type of legal work – the question is really about the couple's capacity to enter the marriage in the first place and it is answered by looking at many aspects of human behaviour, intellectual, emotional, psychological, social, and cultural, both at the time of the wedding and in the history of the marriage.

Most of the cases involve very short marriages and are fairly straight forward. People often seek an annulment because they want to marry again in the Catholic Church. The process for the parties can one of learning from one's mistakes and growing in self-knowledge. Writing the Observations can be amazingly time consuming, because one looks at the evidence very closely. Sometimes the stories are rather heart rending. Nevertheless, there is always an aspect of hope, as people seek to turn their lives around and seek to find fulfilment and happiness in a loving marriage and family life blessed by God, so the work of the Tribunal is very rewarding.

Parish pastoral visits: If you are living alone and would like either Fr Victor or myself to visit, please ring the Office and leave a message with contact details or send an email. I have made a few calls but understandably there have not been many requests, partly I think because of the restrictions on who we can have in our homes and for what reason (While the Parish Office is closed, the telephone is still working.)

Parents have enquired about the celebration of **First Confessions and First Communions** for their children this year have had to be postponed and it is pointless to reschedule matters until we have some certainty about future restrictions. In any case, we will make what arrangements are necessary for these events to be held before the end of the year, if at all possible, and we will all have to be flexible.

Baptisms and Weddings have all had to be rearranged – it looks as if January is going to be a busy month except that I will be away from 9th to 15th January, attending a Latin school in Hobart, *Deo volente*.

Just a reminder that both **St Joseph's and St Augustine's are CLOSED TO THE PUBLIC** but **Mass is celebrated in St Augustine's daily** at 12 noon (and 10 am when Fr Victor is in residence) and you may make a booking to attend (maximum two people) by contacting Jill Ditton: jditton@bigpond.net.au; 0419 635 761. All the necessary Covid regulations must be observed.

Engaging Our Faith: There is some information below about some online courses being provided by Catholic Theological College, many of which could be of great interest to parishioners. Some of the enforced leisure of Covid-time could be directed to further education (and prayer), although I realise also that many families are busier than ever during Covid, combining work, school, and normal family life all under the same roof and in each other's company *all the time!*

sometimes, however, God may pierce the cloud with a 'beam of ghostly light' filling the contemplative with an intense and inexpressible joy, knowledge, and love.

Safeguarding Sunday, 12 September 2021

This week the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney celebrated National Child Protection Week for the fifth year in a row, and today, the week culminates with the celebration of Safeguarding Sunday. The celebration of this past week, leading up to Safeguarding Sunday, has provided us with an opportunity to reflect on how we can improve the ways we care for, protect and listen to the Children and Young People in our communities.

To help us reflect, the Safeguarding Office has developed two new resources; the *Children's Activity Book* and *A Guide for Young People to Better Understand their Wellbeing*.

Additionally, the Safeguarding Offices of the Archdiocese of Sydney, the Diocese of Parramatta and the Diocese of Broken Bay, have collaborated on the development of a resource. BALMAIN AS IT IS NOW (1906)

Time will not permit me to do much more than remind you of our coal mine, piercing the earth by two shafts to a depth of 3000 ft., only exceeded in depth, I understand, by a

few other mines in Belgium, a Company whose pluck and dogged perseverance command the respect and admiration of everyone in Balmain, and the universal hope is that success may some day crown their efforts.

From the "Balmain Banner" of 4th August, 1906, I extract the following information:

"The Balmain coal mine was started in 1894 with half a million capital, and is progressing steadily towards completion. The site covers five acres, and the area of the Company's working concession about 11,000 acres.

"A great claim is put forward for the colliery should coal be raised in sufficient quantity – it will hold a unique position as regards shipping. The distance from the pit's mouth to the quay wall is less than 100 yards: the largest ships coming to the port can be berthed close to the pit's mouth, and by automatic screening and delivery by telescope shoots, can be rapidly and safely filled, and all this can be done with better despatch and economy than in any other part of Australia. The courage of the men who have persevered in this long, costly, and arduous work is magnificent, and without impugning the value of the services of those at present in charge of the mine, the name of Mr J.L.C. Rae as one of the pioneers will long be remembered in Balmain".
